- 6. *A Sustainable* Church Strengthening financial stewardship, parish infrastructure, and local income-generating initiatives to reduce dependence and ensure long-term stability and growth.

Our focus in the coming years must therefore concentrate on mission-driven development, youth empowerment, theological education, social justice, and church sustainability. These are not optional tasks—they are gospel imperatives. As Anglicans in Namibia, we have a sacred duty to be both faithful to our heritage and courageous in innovation. We must build on our legacy by becoming the Church that Namibia will need tomorrow—a Church that listens, learns, and leads with love and hope.

May this Centenary be the flame that kindles our passion, renews our commitment, and prepares us for the next 100 years of proclaiming Christ in Word and deed.

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WELCOME TO THE 100 YEARS ANNIVERSARY: A HISTORIC EVENT IN A LIFETIME

The day has dawned for the centenary celebrations of the arrival and establishment of the Anglican Church in Namibia over more than hundred years ago. In 1915 the Anglican Church arrived in Namibia with Revd Nelson Wellesely Fogarty as a chaplain of the Union Defense Forces in German South West Africa. Then the Church arrived in Windhoek in 1918 when Revd Fogarty was sent to establish a Mission, which was called the Mission of Damaraland. He was later appointed as Archdeacon and then Vicar-General of the Damaraland Mission.

Thereafter, the Church reached Ovamboland in 1924 when Revd George Tobias, who was also a Chaplain in the First World War came to this part of South West Africa. He discovered that the people there needed evangelism and negotiated for the approval of his Bishop in Cape Town to start ministering to them. On the 19th of August 1924 Revd Tobias arrived in Odibo Village and camped under Omwandi tree. This was also the day of the first site meeting with the local traditional authority. Present at the site meeting with Revd Tobias was his companion Revd R.L. White; their chauffer; Mr Haufiku ya Kasheeta, the Headman of Onekwaya West Village; Mr Nicodemus Kaluvi, Headman of Onengali Village and also on his capacity as Chief Headman of the surrounding Villages. It was then during this site meeting that the Chief Headman Kaluvi handed the piece of land, Odibo, to Revd Tobias for the establishment of his ministry. When Revd Tobias, affectionately known as Lukenge, received the land his first concern was to find water, build a shelter for accommodation and a chapel. Tobias founded the Ovamboland Mission of the Anglican Church and developed the ministry with three components ecclesiastical, education and health which started from under the Omwandi tree, named Omwandi waLukenge at Odibo Village.

The St. Mary's Odibo Mission became the mother and headquarters of the Ovamboland Mission of the Anglican Church in Namibia and the hub for the Anglican Church mission extension work in the northern part of Namibia. The following are parish churches which grew directly from the Mother Church: Holy Cross Onamunama, 1928; St Cuthbert Onamutai, 1931; Christ the King Onekwaya, 1936; Holy Spirit Oshandi, 1936; St Luke Epinga; 1936; St Magdalene Omboloka, 1942; the Church of Transfiguration Ondangwa, 1959; the Church of the Good Shepherd Okathitu, 1965; and St Thomas Oshakati, 1967. The work of the church grew and everywhere a parish church was built, a school and clinic were also built. In addition, full-fledged hospitals were built at St Mary's Odibo and the Holy Spirit Oshandi. Later, the Ovamboland Mission of the Anglican Church and the Mission of Damaraland became the Diocese of Damaraland. Around 1970, years before the liberation of south West Africa from the apartheid regime of South Africa, and in anticipation of the independence of Namibia, the Diocese of Damaraland was renamed the Anglican Diocese of Namibia.

Based on this brief historical background the official Centenary Celebrations to mark the arrival of the Anglican Church in Namibia should have been either for 1915 or 1918. However, we find it very important and gratifying to combine the celebrations into a single centenary celebration of the Anglican Diocese of Namibia. The celebration will be mandated by the theme: *"Commemorating achievements and visualizing the future of the Anglican Diocese of Namibia."* Therefore, the main purpose of the centenary celebration is to:

- Commemorate the historic centenary milestone;
- Document the journey, achievements and challenges over the past century; and

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• Treasure the legacy and inspire the vision of the Anglican Diocese of Namibia.

The main celebration event will be hosted by St Mary's Odibo Mission, being the Mother of the Anglican Church in Namibia, it is most appropriate for the Mission to be the venue for the main Centenary Celebration. The management team of the Mission, the residences and the entire community of Odibo Village are highly gratified to host this momentous and impactful event.

We, wholeheartedly, welcome the invited guests, friends, supporters, peace lovers and all Anglicans to come in great numbers and rejoice together with us and praise the Lord, for He is gracious.

Subsequently, at all times the Mission, *Omisioni* as it is affectionately known, has provided a space for important religious occasions (synods, ordinations) and social gatherings, including this Centenary Celebration. We are therefore honoured to share this wonderful space with all of you as we celebrate 100 years, an important milestone in the existence and history of the Diocese of Namibia. We hope you enjoy your time here during the Centenary and take a moment to appreciate the rich heritage and history that surrounds us. Equally, we would like you to feel at home, explore and participate in all the activities and amenities that we have prepared for our joint enjoyment.

As you peruse through this Centenary Celebration Programme, we encourage you to look out for specific activities during the Centenary week, which among others include: (1) daily thoughtprovoking talks about the legacy, history and future of the Anglican Church in Namibia and the services it offers - these will be delivered by seasoned, knowledgeable speakers and followed by moderated discussions; (2) cultural performances including storytelling and poetry about important historical events and personalities; (3) gospel music; (4) scheduled guided tours; (5) exhibitions and many more. <u>**The Founders Parade**</u>: The Centenary Parade is held to depict the arrival of and obtaining of land from Local and/or Traditional Authorities.

<u>Parade Formation</u>: Parade participants will all meet at **Etale laNengali by 08h00 in the morning.** Under the Leadership of the Diocesan Bishop the Parade and Grand Marshall will be organised in groups of walkers, donkey/oxen carts, bicycles, motorbikes, trucks, 4X4's, sedan cars and so forth.

<u>Parade Procession</u>: From *Etale laNengali* and led by the Diocesan Bishop and Parade Grand Marshall in a vehicle of their choice to be known as "the Parade Vehicle". The Parade Vehicle will be followed by the walkers' group (all who choose to walk) of Mr Shokonawa and the St. Mary's Odibo High School learners carrying the Centenary Banner. This group will be followed by the Brass Band in collaboration with Commissioner Sam Shaalulange (walking).

The Archdeacons will follow, in a form of the four periods, depicting:

- The Arrival of missionaries at Walvisbay; Windhoek; and Odibo; celebrating our ancestors and founders, using similar mode of transport used at the time;
- Mission expansion to outstations, using similar mode of transport used at the time;
- The Struggle for Independence (using similar mode of transport used at the time); and
- Independence and the Born Frees (using similar mode of transport used at the time).

Thereafter, the general population will follow according to seniority and in vehicles of their choice.

Procession Route: Once in formation, the Parade will move from the **Etale laNengali** along the main road via Onamhinda village, through the School Gate then to Omwandi waLukenge. At Omwandi, learners will dramatise a play of missionaries' arrivals at Odibo, and thereafter we continue to Olupale laLukenge to enjoy an afternoon of performances by Church Guilds (*ADONACO; Mother's Union; the Youth Organisation; Bernard Muzeki, Server's Guild, and Sunday School*) as well as St Mary's High School Student Christian Movement (SCM) and selected visiting gospel and cultural groups.

Dress Code: Parade participants are encouraged to adorn on attires of their choices that showcase elements of the Namibian rich and diverse cultures or wear centenary T-shirts.
